<b>Strategies</b>	<p>The teaching of the course Human Rights and Democracy is based on the direct explanation of basic concepts in a clear and simplified manner, with students being actively involved in discussion and questioning to enhance understanding and comprehension. Theoretical topics are also linked to real-life examples in order to illustrate the importance of human rights and democracy and their role in society, while encouraging students to express their opinions and develop awareness of the importance of respecting rights and public freedoms.</p>
