Module Aims, Learning Outcomes and Indicative Contents

Module Aims	1. This course aims to: 1. Introduce students to the concept of human rights, their historical origins, and their development across different eras. 2. Explain the philosophical and legal foundations of human rights and their relationship to human dignity. 3. Clarify the concept of democracy, its forms, and its fundamental principles. 4. Highlight the complementary relationship between human rights and the democratic system. 5. Develop students' awareness of the importance of respecting human rights in contemporary societies. 6. Promote the culture of citizenship, the rule of law, and peaceful political participation. 7. Enable students to analyze human rights violations and explore ways to address them. 8. Equip students with the ability to link constitutional texts with international human rights standards.
Module Learning Outcomes	4. An ability to communicate effectively with a range of audiences.
Indicative Contents	1. The concept of human rights and their historical origins. 2. Sources of human rights (national and international). 3. Classification and types of human rights. 4. The concept of democracy and its historical development. 5. Principles of democracy (the rule of law, separation of powers, political pluralism). 6. The relationship between human rights and democracy. 7. The role of the United Nations and international organizations in the protection of human rights. 8. Human rights in national constitutions.

Learning and Teaching Strategies

Strategies	The teaching of the course Human Rights and Democracy is based on the direct explanation of basic concepts in a clear and simplified manner, with students being actively involved in discussion and questioning to enhance understanding and comprehension. Theoretical topics are also linked to real-life examples in order to illustrate the importance of human rights and democracy and their role in society, while encouraging students to express their opinions and develop awareness of the importance of respecting rights and public freedoms.
